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LAW ENFORCEMENT CALLS IT "CRIME OF OPPORTUNITY"

Small but effective ways to help deter crime in Your home & neighborhood By Darrell Wood

Keep your garage door down. An open garage is an invitation for grab-and-run burglars. It takes less than 10 seconds to run in and grab your tools. This is your # 1 crime.

Do not keep anything in view in your car. Cellphones, boxes, and bags are all reasons for a thief to smash out your car windows. These crimes happen very regularly and quickly.

DO NOT leave a garage door opener / remote in your car. Garage door openers are an easy way for criminals to get in your house.

Report suspicious activity. Make a note of suspicious cars and their license plates. Criminals often return to an area that proves fruitful.

Know your neighbors. The best protection you can have is a neighbor that knows your cars and schedule and will pick up your newspapers when you are away. Be that neighbor.

Call your crime watch hotline. Stay informed of area criminal activity. Read crime reports on our *Nextdoor* Website given by our *Crime Watch Committee* or call the *Eastwood Neighborhood Crime Watch Line*: (214) 967-5187.

Mark your alley. If you don't have your street address on the rear of your home, please get one. Emergency vehicles (from the fire department and police), as well as our *Volunteers in Patrol*, need to accurately identify your home when in the alley.

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Riparian Year in Review

Here is a quick overview of what the *Riparian Committee* has been up to in late 2013 and so far in 2014:

- **Erosion control.** Our year starts a little early in December when the first Christmas trees arrive. As in years past, most of the trees used for erosion control come from Trow Tree Farms, who donates unsalable or surplus trees. This year we placed about 180 trees along the banks of Dixon Branch, staked in place with steel rebar.
- **Bluebird boxes.** Six nest boxes were mounted on the backs of sign posts in the greenbelt. We did not see any bluebirds this year, but the park is good habitat and sometimes it takes several years for bluebirds to find new boxes.
- **Maintenance and new planting at Entry Garden.** We have been doing more weeding and planting at the monument at Peavy and Creekmere. The biggest additions are three new trees to replace the failing Texas mountain laurel. The new trees are possumhaw hollies, a native deciduous relative of the yaupon. Look for bright orange to red berries on these trees during winter.
- **Ragweed and brush control.** This is an ongoing effort. In 2013, we had a major infestation of giant ragweed, a ten-foot tall weed that causes terrible allergy problems for many people. A rented brush mower proved very effective! Ragweed was much reduced in 2014, and we continued search-and-destroy operations through the summer. We have also done selective removal of invasive brush, such as privet and Chinese honeysuckle.

In the rest of 2014 we will continue ragweed and brush control, and prepare ourselves for the big Christmas tree/erosion control festival starting in December.

Come join us, we're in constant need for volunteers. Keep an eye out for our memos on Nextdoor.

Occasionally, I hear complaints about how the park looks. (No one seems to complain about how the erosion control protects our trees.) With more volunteers, we can better control undesirable plants like ragweed, and increase the wildflowers. *With more volunteers, we can make a bigger difference!*
