WILDFLOWERS TO WATCH FOR IN OCTOBER

Here in Eastwood we have not one but two wildflower seasons. The first one is in spring and early summer, beginning with bluebonnets sometimes as early as March, and ending with lemon mint, cutleaf daisies, and firewheels in July. The second one usually begins in September with the first cool front and rain. This year the mild summer caused the second season to begin early.

Have you seen the tall spikes of sky blue flowers in the meadow yet? These are pitcher sage and have been blooming almost all summer. They are very spectacular this year, with some plants topping seven feet! Pitcher sage is a perennial that almost always grows in association with prairie grasses in very sunny places.



Goldenrod is Innocent! – Ragweed is Not

In the margins of the woods along Creekmere and Sinclair are four-foot wands with bright golden flowers at the top. Tall goldenrod blooms in September and October. Many people blame this plant for fall allergy symptoms, but it is innocent. Goldenrod blooms at the same time as ragweed which is the real cause of your misery.

Ragweed flowers are almost invisible, but produce vast amounts of wind-blown pollen. These two species illustrate a botanical rule of thumb: plants with showy flowers are pollinated by insects or other animals and do not release pollen into the air. Plants with tiny, inconspicuous flowers are wind pollinated, and are often the reason you reach for the antihistamines.

Eastwood Wildflowers – A Hard-Earned Beauty

The fall showstopper is Maximilian sunflower. Every year in the first week of October, this perennial sunflower creates a wall of yellow along Creekmere. Its height varies with summer rainfall. In recent drought years it was only two to three feet tall. But this year it may grow to its full six-foot glory. Like many other sunflowers, the blossoms are intensely yellow with orange centers.

Where did these wildflowers come from? The goldenrod was probably lurking for decades along the tree line. When we stopped mowing the park to within



an inch of its life, it made a dramatic comeback. The Maximilian sunflower and pitcher sage were absent from the park when we started the riparian project back in 2002.



In 2004 we used grant funds from the US Fish and Wildlife Service to seed the Creekmere meadow with native Blackland prairie seed collected at a Nature Conservancy preserve, Clymer Meadow. The Maximilian sunflowers, pitcher sage, and dozens of other wildflower species are the result.
